## Neighbourhood Watch

We are appealing for information following a distressing incident of **criminal damage** at **St Gregory's Church in Morville** during the early hours of **Monday 15th June**.

Significant damage has been caused, including:

- **Broken windows** — several panes were smashed, leaving glass scattered inside and outside the building.
- **Headstones pushed over** — multiple gravestones in the churchyard were deliberately toppled, causing further upset to families and the wider community.

This behaviour shows a clear disregard for a historic local landmark and for the people who care for it.

## Appeal for Information

We are asking residents to think back to the early hours of **Monday 15th June**. If you noticed **suspicious behaviour**, unusual noise, unfamiliar vehicles, or individuals loitering around the **Morville** area, in particular the Church, your information could be vital.

Even small details — a description, a time, a direction of travel — may help us identify those responsible.

If you have CCTV, doorbell footage, or dash-cam recordings from around that time, please review them and get in touch if anything stands out.

- **Share any CCTV or footage**

Your support helps us protect our community spaces and hold offenders to account.

## **Morville Parish Council**

The Parish Council's Restore Shropshire's Verges Project [ RSVP] aims to establish wildflowers on verges along the A458 from just beyond Morville to Muckley Cross - visually attractive, of biodiversity benefit and, in the long run, cheaper to maintain than the previous management regime.

The RSVP botany expert visited the site on June 15<sup>th</sup> and was very impressed with the number of wildflower species at this early stage; we await his species list and advice on future management to encourage their proliferation.

Volunteers litter-picked these verges in advance of the first "cut & collect" on 30.3.2026.

## **Morville School News**

### **Hello from the Morville School family.**

Into the final four weeks of the summer term both pupils and teachers are busy making sure that we finish all our work and are ready for the long summer break.

Like everyone we are experiencing the very high temperatures that have taken us all by surprise. It is disappointing but we are having to curtail some of our outdoor PE lessons and some of our planned external sporting events are being affected by the weather.

We are making sure that children are wearing their sunhats, have plenty of sun protection cream on and are not running around in this fierce heat. They, like the footballers, are having plenty of ‘hydration’ breaks – it is essential that we keep everyone safe.

Luckily we held our sport’s day well before the hot weather arrived. In fact at one stage we thought we may have to cancel because of the rain! Fortunately it stayed dry and the children took part in a range of events including; sprints, egg and spoon races, sack races and hurdles. They also did the long jump, javelin and speed jumps. It was a successful morning – every child received a certificate for taking part and children in the winning house also had a medal. We were delighted that so many of our families turned out to cheer the children on and we all thoroughly enjoyed the morning.

Next year sport’s day may be even more spectacular, because we are delighted to announce that we have achieved the School Games Platinum Mark Award for the 2025/26 academic year, the highest level you can achieve. The School Games Mark is a Government-led award scheme launched in 2012, facilitated by the Youth Sport Trust to reward schools for their commitment to the development of competition across their school and into the community, and we are thrilled to have been recognised for our success. Well done Morville Primary!

Another very successful event was Shropshire Sings. This is an annual event where children from all over the county learn to sing the same songs and then all come together at the West Midlands Showground to perform to friends and families. Morville children are always very enthusiastic and practise diligently after school for weeks before the event so they can do their very best on the night! Once again our children were supported and encouraged to do their best and it was an extremely enjoyable evening.

Continuing the musical theme, our Rock Steady bands are almost ready for their concert on the last Monday of term. Everyone is looking forward to seeing and hearing them play the new tunes they have been learning, and we are sure there will also be some dancing in the aisles!

**Chestnut Class** have all been working hard, as usual. They have been learning about sustainability and how important it is that there is enough for everyone. Their studies have seen them investigate where the food we buy in our supermarkets has come from. Finding out that some comes from places as far away as South Africa and South America and just how many miles it has travelled before it reaches the shelves has been quite a surprise. As part of this topic the children visited Shropshire Hills Discovery Centre in Craven Arms. Here they made soup, baked bread and even churned their own butter. They saw a wide range of fruit and vegetables that are grown locally and compared this to the food that has travelled halfway around the world. Year six are now preparing for leaving Morville and moving on to their secondary schools. They have transition days looming and then they will be preparing for their leavers' service – so still a lot to do before they finally say goodbye.

**Birch Class** have been learning about Australia. They have found out about all the different places, all the types of animals (including venomous snakes!) and the sports that people play. It was also exciting because they actually had Australian visitors in the classroom! Alfie and Isabelle are currently on holiday in England and Alfie (age 7) agreed to come and tell the children about his life in Australia. It was amazing when he said that his school had 1500 students! Much, much bigger than Morville. The children will soon be visiting the Wild Zoological Park in Halfpenny Green where they will see kookaburras and wallabies for themselves.

**Oak Tree Class** have been continued both their inside and outside learning. This half term our youngest children have been learning about transport. They have looked at different types of vehicles and compared new forms of transport to how people used to travel in the past. They have painted cars and trucks and made models. Very soon they are going to Acton Scott farm where they will see a range of different vehicles and farm machinery.

More exciting news from Morville is that from September, Morville Primary will have a new Head of School. Mr Dan Russell will be taking the helm and he is very excited to meet the children and the Morville families. This will be the last news update from Miss Docherty and Mrs Aston but we are sure Mr Russell will be keeping you up to date with Morville Primary news in the future.

## **Reader Ramblings**

Well here I am, back after my intended three month sabbatical turned into an almost six month long one. Some of you will have heard me say that transitions in life can often be tricky and I spent the first two weeks transitioning into my sabbatical feeling slightly anxious and thinking. “I don’t know how to do a sabbatical.” Fortunately, God came to my rescue with the realisation that this was a time to focus more on God and on being rather than doing. Of course there were choices to make, if I wanted to spend more quality time with God it became clear I needed to spend less time on social media, put my phone down more and turn off the T.V.

I needed to disconnect to give me more time and space to connect with God myself and others.

Disconnecting was going to be a bit of a challenge but I persevered because, even though I accept there are some positive elements to the use of social media and AI, I am very suspicious of the corporate personalities and money that promote both so forcefully, it may please you to know I agree with Pope Leo XIV. “AI must serve humanity not concentrate power.” Still I did disconnect and I found myself thinking and meditating a lot on my relationship with God and my relationships with people.

Since November three dear souls who over a period of years I came to love and care for very much have gone home to be with God. Sitting with those who knew and loved them better than I, not looking for distractions nor running from grief, but being fully present to it, changed me for the better. It is true that you can always make time for the things that are important to you. I now intentionally carve out more time to spend with God and with the people I love and am learning to love myself a little more in the process.

Our faith is a relational faith centring on an intimate loving relationship with God through Jesus Christ. Community and the individual connections we make in our communities are vitally important for good spiritual, emotional, intellectual and physical health. Through the conversations we have, as we listen to the stories of others as well as share our own stories, a very special magic happens and we become woven into each other’s lives and become part of each other’s history. As Barak Obama says. “Everyone has a story to tell, if you just care to listen, sacred stories full of courage and humour and grace and each of those stories in some way connected to our own.”

Perhaps my experience may encourage one or two others to maybe take up the challenge of disconnecting in order to re-connect with God and each other.

## **The power of friendship**

Recently, I've been thinking a lot about friendship: what starts it, what builds it and what sustains it.

Our family moved to Hereford a little over a year ago. When we sensed a call from God to come here, we knew we would be starting again. We knew no one locally, which meant building friendships and community from the beginning.

Friendship doesn't arrive fully formed. It grows slowly, often in what Scripture calls "the day of small things": small conversations, small acts of kindness, small decisions to keep turning up. Like many relationships, friendship begins with connection but grows through countless small choices over time.

Even Jesus invested deeply in only a few close friendships. We cannot invest deeply in everyone, but we can choose to show up consistently for a few people: to cherish them, serve them, forgive them and remain faithful companions through life's ups and downs.

I have often found this challenging because it means choosing to go first: starting the conversation, suggesting meeting up, offering help, buying the coffee and risking things feeling a little awkward. I have learnt from my husband, who is much more natural at including others and making space for friendship than I am. Yet, as I have been brave, I have discovered that many people are open to friendship. They are waiting, just as we are.

One of my most significant friendships began in my thirties in a very ordinary way. While volunteering, I simply said to someone, "This is a bit awkward, but I'd really like to be friends." It sounds disarmingly simple, but it takes courage. Often all it takes is one person willing to make the first move.

There are seasons in life that carry a particular loneliness: the early years of parenting, times of transition, when friends move away, or later, when friends go to glory. Loneliness is not unusual; it is part of the human experience. Yet rather than turning on the TV, perhaps the invitation is to look up and out: to join a club, volunteer, pick up the phone or invite someone for dinner regardless of the state of our life, kitchen or garden.

Friendship is not only about reaching out; we also have to learn to receive. It can dent our pride to let it be known that we can't manage everything. Yet some of the greatest moments of friendship in my life have come through friends offering practical help when I didn't realise how much I needed it.

One of the great gifts the church can still offer is community: a place where people of all ages and backgrounds can gather regularly, be known and build genuine friendships. When God said to Adam, "It is not good for a person to be alone," he knew that would apply to all of us.

So my prayer this year is to learn how to be a better friend to those I already love, and to ask God who in my life is lonely, where I could be their friend, and they mine. I wonder if God might be asking some of you to pray this too?
