Morville School News

Hello from the Morville School family.

Our whole school kick started October on Monday 6th with a joyful Harvest Festival celebration at St Gregory's. The children's voices rang out across the church and fields with their beautiful renditions of 'Harvest Samba' and 'Thank you for a Million Brilliant Things'. The children gave real thanks for all the things Harvest brings us and invited our Morville families to do the same. It was wonderful to read and share the many things that we are all so thankful for.

The sports season has continued to bring new opportunities, with four pupils taking on the role as Bronze Ambassadors for the school. These children are excited to lead new sports activities and games across the school for their Morville friends. The children did a fantastic job showing real determination and skill. Our Year Two children also really enjoyed their opportunity to attend the KS1 multi-skills event at Oldbury Wells school. The children were enthusiastic and demonstrated determination and resilience in the range of activities they took part in. In Oak Tree class this month the children have been having great fun exploring their senses. The children have taken part in a range of activities to really understand not only the different parts of our bodies but the purpose they play in our everyday lives and functions. The children started their work on the senses by exploring how sight can keep them safe before moving on to touch and the words we use to describe objects. The children have also used tasting plates to discover the differences between sour, bitter, sweet and salty and sniff pots to explore how we can identify objects including foods and plants by their smell alone. The children will be completing their work on this at the end of the week by considering why the sense of hearing is important and taking a fun sound test to see if they can identify different sounds, as well as seeing if they can identify their classmates from the sound of their voice. In Birch Tree Class the children have been learning what a monarch is and what they do. They have learnt that the current monarch of the UK is King Charles III before travelling back into the past to find out about three famous queens from British history: Elizabeth I, Victoria and Elizabeth II. The children enjoyed using paintings of Victorian artist, James Stephanoff, to explore Buckingham Palace and find out how Queen Victoria used Buckingham Palace to perform her royal duties. The children have also been comparing and contrasting the time periods associated with the reign of each of our famous queens, discussing the similarities and differences between the time periods. This has helped the children to develop a robust understanding of how some aspects of our daily lives have changed over time. In Chestnut Tree Class the children have really been enjoying their learning all about 'The Marvellous Maya'. The children have analysed a range of Maya artefacts and discuss what materials they were made from, how they were made and what they were used for. They were then challenged to make their own Maya tile or stella from clay using the techniques they have learned about to shape, join and decorate clay. There have been some amazing creations that the children are particularly proud of.

The children have also been learning about Rock 'n' Roll, finding out the history and learning to play a walking bass line. The children have even performed a hand jive as well as learning to sing 'Rock Around the Clock'

Bishop's Letter

The parish where I served as vicar in Sussex had a population of around 3000. In the first world war there were about 800 and 33 names were recorded on the roll of honour. It is hard to imagine now that level of loss. The vicar lost his son and nearly every family in the village was affected. Every year, helped by an exhibition of their lives by a wonderful Church Warden, the number at Remembrance Day service grew. His research at one point called into question whether one of the names remembered on the WWII board had actually died! A brief panic was relieved when he discovered the person living in Cananda was the same name but a different person. Few had any connection now with those we remembered, even from WWII when another twenty lost their lives. For many people it was the only service of the year they attended. It never failed to be a moving occasion.

In part, attendance was an opportunity to pay respects to those who paid the ultimate sacrifice. But there was a deeper action as well. Those we remembered died because they believed a particular set of values were worth fighting for. They fought against tyranny, the treating of one group of people as inferior to others, and the idea that might makes right. The Nazi regime was the antithesis of the love that Jesus urges as our root value from which all else flows. These Christian values are not intuitive to human beings. As the historian Tom Holland has conclusively argued in his book Dominion, a society wouldn't have these values but for Christian faith. Even the nihilist philosopher Nietzsche recognised this when he said, "When one gives up the Christian faith, one pulls the right to Christian morality out from under one's feet. Christianity is a system, a whole view of things thought out together. By breaking one main concept out of it, the faith in God, one breaks the whole: nothing necessary remains in one's hands." He did this ending up with a philosophical system where power was the ultimate goal and looking out for the weak was despised.

In the confusing mixture of motivations that drove people to attend the 'Unite the Kingdom' march in London a few weeks ago were calls to reclaim the Christian heritage of the nation. In some way this is commendable, but the wielding of crosses in that context felt anything but the sacrificial love that the cross represents. Symbols are powerful things and need to be wielded with care. Crosses can be symbols of love and sacrifice or burnt by men in white robes on the way to a lynching. As Christians we assert the former as the only true representation of our nation's values.

The Carol Service at Morville Church will be on **Sunday 14th December at 4pm** followed by mince pies and mulled wine. On Christmas Day there will be a service (Holy Communion) at 11.15am, led by Rev Simon Boxall. There will be no service on Christmas Eve or on Sunday 28th December.
