Morville Parish Council

Following the discussion at the September meeting of the Parish Council, a meeting has been arranged between parishioners and councillors, the Police and Crime Commissioner John Campion, and Stuart Anderson MP. We will be making them aware of the problems that we are experiencing with speeding motorists, particularly through Morville, and hopefully investigating possible sources of funding for appropriate traffic calming measures.

We will also be meeting with representatives of Bloor Homes, the principal developer of the proposed 'Tasley Garden Village'.

During November, the Planning Inspectors are holding Public Hearings regarding Specific Sites – along with Tasley PC and Bridgnorth TC, we have submitted written statements to the Inspectors, concerning our continued opposition to the proposals, which we will follow up with participation in the Hearings.

Bloor Homes have also submitted their contribution, and we will be discussing this with them at our meeting, prior to the Hearings.

A report of each of these meetings will be presented at our next PC meeting, on November 11th, when we will also be discussing a Draft Budget for the coming year.

Parishioners, as always, are welcome to attend.

Main tasks will be to clear leaves in car park area, cut the inside of hedges and strim the grass below.

In particular, Miss Owen was especially proud of the way our school worked in co-operation with the girls from Beckbury CE Primary School to form a girls' football team to represent both schools at Oldbury Wells school. Both the Beckbury and Morville girls were a credit to their schools. They didn't let the awful weather dampen their spirits, got stuck in and were so well behaved. To top it off they were placed 3rd which was much deserved. We are so proud of them all.

The school Harvest Service was a wonderful celebration at St Gregory's Church this half term, with the children showcasing their wonderful work. The October meeting of Morville WI had a slight change to our usual format; after we had sung Jerusalem, our president introduced the speakers who were from the charity that we have been raising money for this year, Read Easy.

They started by telling us a bit about the history of Read Easy which was founded in 2010 in Dorchester Prison by Ginny Williams-Ellis who was responsible for running the prisoner-to-prisoner reading programme.

She quickly realised that many more people could benefit from the one-to-one approach to teaching adults to read, and it became clear that for various reasons there were a number of adults that did not have even a basic level of reading.

When Read Easy UK was established in 2011 to help volunteers to set up groups in other parts of the country, a government survey put the number of adults unable to read at 2.4 million in England alone.

Read Easy are in the process of setting up a group in Bridgnorth where they will be looking for safe spaces to use for one-to-one training. They will be putting out more information on social media and printed leaflets soon.

After business of the evening had been concluded, it was onto the AGM.

Our Treasurer kicked off proceedings with the presentation and adoption of the Financial Statement.

Our President followed with a report on the Village Hall and then our Vice President gave a report on the Shropshire Federation of Women's Institutes AGM which she attended at the end of May, when the speaker was none other than Sarah Clarke, better known as Black Rod.

Then it was our President's turn to present the Annual Report which this year was a slideshow of the year's events.

Who could forget the lovely guest speakers; Lucinda Lovesey from the TV programme The Great Pottery Throw Down, or Emma Spenser and her fascinating talk about the Women's Land Army, or Daisy Askins who taught us willow weaving.

Then there were outings to Farlow Farm Nurseries and Much Wenlock for the Olympic Trail. There were some great photo's of another great year for Morville WI.

On Remembrance

Dear Friends,

A Christian poet once wrote, "History repeats itself; it has to, no-one listens!" These are words we do well to remember in our current international climate, with wars in the Middle East and Ukraine. As we remember the great conflicts of the 20th century and the political context that led to those wars, there has been some progress, in the West at least. A lot of the warlike rhetoric and posturing, the appeal to patriotism, and the sense of our individual identities being tied up with national ones seems strange and dated. At the time, these attitudes, combined with the arrogance of empire, were a toxic combination that led to the horrific conflict with the loss of so many lives. However, elements of these attitudes remain. We always prefer our own tribe. There is an alienation that has opened people to the rise of the far right with its attempt to blame all our ills on immigration. A knowledge of history shows where these things can end up.

Christians are instructed to pray for our political leaders and to live in peace where we can, but one of the things that got the early Christians into trouble was their political subversion. There will always be elements of our culture and politics we want to affirm, but there will be others we want to challenge. Early Christian worship declared that Caesar wasn't Lord; Jesus was. That sort of talk could (and did) get them killed. The personal security that sustained this courage was a conviction that they were first and foremost citizens of heaven. In Jesus they had experienced the power of the other country breaking into their experience. We will remember our national tragedies and sacrifice on Remembrance Day. But every Sunday we remember a tragedy and sacrifice that turned into a glorious victory. Christ's death. It points us to the ultimate powerlessness of violence to achieve real change. It subverts the doctrine that might is right. Sadly, it may take a lot of bloodshed for that to come home to Hamas, Hezbollah, the Israeli government and the Russian army.
