# **CLERGY THOUGHTS FROM MARJORIE**

Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust destroys and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also. (Matthew 6:19-21)

A difficult part of any minister's job is asking for money but sadly it is something that is necessary and increasingly frequent. Depending on how you look at it, the Church is blessed or cursed with a huge number of buildings. They are almost always beautiful and dearly loved, but they are mostly old and often in poor repair, needing a great deal of TLC - and that takes money - a lot of it. All our churches put a great deal of work and effort into fundraising and last month's Cross+Link showed that there were a lot exciting events going on across the benefice, so all our churches are alive and well even in this vacancy; but despite that, there is often a shortfall.

In these difficult financial times, most charities are in similar straits and appeals seem to be multiplying daily. A strategy often employed is to request donors to consider leaving a legacy to their favourite charity. Often these are medical - such as Cancer Research or Marie Curie Nurses and those who have lost a family member to a disease will be moved to leave such a legacy so that others will be spared similar pain. But the real push seems to come from animal charities. We are supposed to be a nation of animal lovers, I guess, and you can't turn on the TV without some sonorous celeb telling you that if you love animals, please consider leaving a legacy to The RSPCA/Cats' Protection/Dogs' Trust/The Donkey Sanctuary etc etc. And to add to the incentive they often offer free assistance with will writing.

The Church seems to have missed a trick here. Yes, we have finally entered the 21<sup>st</sup> century and started using electronic devices. But we were late to the fair on legacies and only recently seem to have woken up to their potential. Of course, everyone's priority will be to provide for their family, and no one would argue with that. But many of us delay sorting out the minutiae of our wills because it is, admittedly, a depressing task. And I confess I am a terrible feet-dragger. I have been meaning to update my own will since my husband died in 2001 and still haven't got round to it so I am talking to myself as much as you. But a very small proportion of our estate, as little as a legacy of 1%, if we all did it, would make a tremendous difference to the church and make our treasurers very happy. *Marjorie*

# ON BEING STUCK BEHIND A TRACTOR!

Hoorah!! It is harvest time again!! There you are, hurtling through the lanes in your car on some mission of huge national importance, muttering venomously at cyclists in helmets shaped like wasps' bottoms, inconsiderate enough to want a bit of your road, rounding a bend and coming up behind the ponderous majesty of a tractor and trailer. On closer inspection over the next ten minutes you conclude that it is actually a convoy of three tractors and two trailers and the glory of the aforementioned ponderous majesty begins to wear a bit thin! Hoorah. It is harvest time again. And I would wager a considerable sum that most of you do not at this point start singing songs of everlasting thanks and praise to our great God for his generous provision, or blessing the farmers for the work they do to put food on our plates!

So here is your challenge for harvest and beyond. I've learned to do it and if I can manage it anyone can. If you get stuck on your travels behind a tractor or a combine or a plough or any other mysteriously shaped implement of the sod, (by which I mean, of course, the soil!) take it as an opportunity for reflection, for thanksgiving and for praise.

Why should you bother? Firstly, because praising God for what he gives us should become a matter of habit in all of us and secondly because as a nation we owe a huge debt of gratitude to the farmers who are taken totally for granted by most of us who have become emotionally and practically detached from the source of our food.

We cannot and must not take national food security as a given. Climate change and population growth mean that it is more difficult to produce enough grain for the world's needs. The situation in Ukraine is calamitous for the food security of millions in vulnerable nations. Global markets will sell to the highest bidder regardless of need. Political mismanagement and the power of global enterprise in the inherently local business of food production are putting countless family farms out of business.

So when you get stuck behind that tractor take a deep breath, smile and wave at the farmer, even if he does stare back at you with blank amazement and ask for God's blessing on his family and work. Reflect on our corporate relationship to food and the land as the God given source of all our well-being and praise God from whom all blessings flow.

And if the vicar rushes in late to take your service on a Sunday morning you will understand why! Happy harvest to you all. I hope to see some of you at your harvest service.

# The Story of Luke

On 18<sup>th</sup> October we celebrate St Luke's Day. Here is a reminder of his life and work, "in his own words."

I don't suppose people know much about me personally. I don't like to talk about myself a lot but I thought you might like to know how it came about that I spent so much of my life writing. And it is my writings rather than myself that I hope will become well known, and that they will help people to learn about Jesus and the beginnings of his church.

First, you should know that I am not a Jew, so I did not know much about their history and culture, except as an observer. I came from the Greek speaking city of Antioch. The Greeks there were the best educated, informed and cultured people in Europe - indeed in the Empire. They were great seekers after truth; and I was brought up in that tradition. I was well -educated but taught to think for myself. I wanted to help people so I trained as a doctor - Greeks made the best doctors too. Paul himself once called me his "Beloved physician."

As time went on, I began to travel a great deal, to learn more of the people and countries around me. On one trip, I met Paul and his companions. I thought at first that they were Jews and so they were by birth and upbringing. But now they called themselves "Followers of the Way." Later they would be called Christians. They were travelling around to as many important cities as they could to tell the people about a man called Jesus, who, they claimed had died to save his people. I said I was brought up to seek the truth, and when I heard this story of Jesus, I knew I had found it. I, too, became a Christian.

I decided then to give up my work for the time being - although it gave me a good living - and travel with Paul and his companions to help them spread the word about this Christ. Paul was already a well-seasoned traveller. He had visited many of the cities of Asia Minor which later became the country of Turkey and he had finally reached the coast at the port of Troas. And that was where I caught up with him. He was trying to decide where to go next and whether he should turn and retrace his footsteps. But then he had this marvellous vision in which he saw a man of Macedonia

pleading with him to cross the sea to Greece and help him and his fellow countrymen. And that was what he did. And I knew then that I must go with him.

We sailed for Macedonia almost at once and then travelled to the major city of Philippi. I decided that I would be Paul's chronicler. I got him to tell me about his earlier journeys and wrote an account of them and then I personally recorded all our new ventures. Or perhaps I should say adventures for such they were. We continued to travel together for some years; sometimes people wanted to kill us or imprison us but each time we managed to escape, with guidance from the Spirit of God, and with the help of the local Christians.

Paul had many companions over the years. He was tough and uncompromising and not always easy to get on with. And sometimes there were quarrels and splits and some colleagues left to begin their own missions. But I loved him and stayed with him throughout the rest of his life. I stuck it out to the bitter end.

Paul gained many converts and set up new churches wherever he went. But eventually he decided he must go back to Judaea where he had started. He knew it was a great risk because the Jews hated him. And as we expected, they imprisoned him and would have liked to have had him killed, just as they had done to Jesus before him. But Paul insisted on seeing the Roman Governor, and asked him to send him to Rome to be tried before the Emperor himself. He knew that it was a dangerous choice but I think he was excited at the thought of going to Rome, to the very centre of the empire and to take his message even there. Again, I went with him. We had a terrible sea-crossing and at one point were shipwrecked on the island of Malta, but at last we arrived safely in Rome.

The Emperor ignored Paul's arrival and did not bother to see him, but kept him as a prisoner for many months. At first we were quite comfortable because Paul was under house arrest and continued to receive visitors. He never tired of talking about Jesus. But then we were moved to the gaol and were in much worse circumstances. Paul continued to write many letters to his friends in the churches he had started in Asia Minor and Europe. He wrote to his beloved Timothy who was like a son to him and told him that I was with him - the only

one left. Which was true and meant that I had the great privilege of acting as his secretary and scribing many of his wonderful letters. I stayed till his death; for the emperor finally decided that the Christians were becoming too troublesome, and that Paul as the greatest troublemaker of all must be executed. I was overwhelmed with sadness; I had lost my dearest friend.

But I knew that he would want me to continue what he had begun and I still had work to do on my own account; tasks I had set myself to continue Paul's legacy. I gathered together all the records and diaries I had written down in my years on my travels with Paul and turned them into a continuous narrative of the Acts of the Apostles, those followers of Jesus who, like Paul, had built the early church. My words were copied many times and passed around the churches so others could learn and marvel at the work of the Holy Spirit in those early years.

And there was something else I needed to do. I, sadly, never knew Jesus for myself but in my years with Paul, I had met many of those people who had actually known Jesus when he was on earth. I met people like Peter and John and others who had been his disciples. And I was also privileged to meet and speak with his mother, the lady, Mary. They all told me many stories about him which I wrote down. I knew it was important work for there would come a time when everyone who had known him would be dead and only the writings of people like me would remain to tell people about Jesus, and all he did and said and the wonderful news of our salvation through his death and resurrection. So I wrote down all these stories, too; the good news, the Gospel of Christ Jesus. I hope that you, too, have read some of the stories I wrote in my book, the Gospel according to me-Luke.
